"When I was president we had 50 or so members and a yearly budget of a whopping \$3,000. At that time the president presided on Sunday am's. We would start the program by reading an excerpt from a UU pamphlet. One Sunday I made the mistake of reading the entire paragraph which stated that the UU faith was the only one adequate to handle the problems of the nuclear age. I was chastised by several members for being much too evangelical." - Charlie Smith

"My first exposure to the Greenville Unitarians was in the spring of 1976. I had been a Unitarian for many years but had never visited any congregation. Now, newly divorced, I had some new religious freedom and was anxious to use it. The service was at Buist Avenue and was the last service of the church year. Back then Greenville Unitarians did not waste a perfectly good summer with fellowship meetings. Fred Archer did a splendid service concluding with a dedication of a child. When summer was over I joined the group with a real feeling of belonging and an urge to be part of their growth.

I was caught up in the spirit of the group and was ready to take an active part in its growth. I stood for president and was elected twice. During that time we searched for and found our first minister, started meeting in the summer did some river tubing and just continued to grow.

That work left me with a feeling of fatherhood for the group. A feeling that never left me and drove me to one more president's term and continuing active involvement with the Fellowship for many years." - Jim Yockey

During Betsy Smith's term as president in 1979-80, she wrote a grant that was awarded funding by the Veatch Foundation (a funding program set up by the UU Congregation of Shelter Rock, in Manhasset, Long Island, New York that provides grants to UU Congregations across the country). The grant was to cover the costs of producing publicity for the Fellowship. Flyers were created and distributed around Greenville and ads were placed in the newspaper resulting in the doubling of the membership!

"There's really not much I can say except this: John McFerrin was the person who approached me (to become president). Anyone who knew John and especially those that worked with John know how persuasive he could be. Before I realized it, I had agreed to be nominated. I never forgave John for that bit of trickery!" - Janet Aguilar

"During the 1990s, the Fellowship underwent a number of changes - the purchase of the present property, the saying good bye to the Hillcrest building, a revamping of the governance and the start up of the U.U. World of Children. It was a time when anti gay sentiment was running strong in our area as in so many others. With great pride and enthusiasm, the congregation hosted the first meeting of the Pro Justice group and made a strong showing at a City Council meeting where a nationally promoted anti-gay legislation was being considered. We were actually accused of being bussed in agitators!

For me, this was a time when I truly realized that the action arm of social justice is social responsibility - individual as well as communal and I continue to be grateful to have been inspired and energized by the GUUF community."
